Hatshepsut: The Female Pharaoh

Many people have called Hatshepsut (hat-SHEP-soot) the greatest woman in Egypt's history. She lived during the years historians call the New Kingdom.

Before her time, no woman had ever ruled Egypt.

Hatshepsut's father was Thutmose I (THUHT-mohs). When he died, there was no son in direct line to become **pharaoh** (FAIR-o). So, Hatshepsut became an important part of Egypt's history. Sometimes, she shared the throne with her husband. At other times, she ruled alone. Hatshepsut brought energy and wisdom to almost 20 years of Egypt's history.
