Top **10** Things Your Kindergartner

Needs to Know

- 1. Ten basic colors: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple, black, brown, white, and pink
- 2. Recognizing and writing the letters of the alphabet in upper and lowercase
- **3. Relationship between letters and the sounds** they make
- 4. Sight words 1–100
- 5. Writing consonant-vowel-consonant words (e.g., bat and fan)
- 6. Retelling a story that has been read aloud
- 7. Reading and writing simple sentences
- Counting, reading, writing, and comparing numbers 0–20
- 9. Classifying and counting objects in categories
- **10. Shapes** (e.g., square, triangle, rectangle, circle)



Discoveries Unlimited

Your kindergartner has been investigating his or her world since birth. Every new thing was a discovery that had to be tasted, touched, smelled, and watched.

Try these activities to keep those discoveries going.

Listen

Turn a routine walk into a nature sounds walk and listen for animals, birds, the wind, rain, etc.

Observe

Collect some clean snow in a glass jar and let it melt to see if it still looks clean. Let it evaporate.

Measure

Plant some seeds and track their growth.

Explore

Gather a variety of objects, such as light and heavy paper, white and colored paper, clear and colored glass bottles, etc. What happens when they are placed in the sun?

Touch

Touch things that are smooth, sticky, rough, soft, or hard.

Journal

Record findings in a notebook with drawings or pictures. Use a camera to document discoveries.

Keep that wonder about the world alive by staying alert to opportunities to stop and observe, touch, and discuss.
