Act 4

Caroline: I'm almost finished sewing together all of

the pieces for the stars. It has taken me so

much longer than I expected.

Grandmother: That's because each of the 15 stars must be

2 feet wide.

Mary: It would have been easier if I could have

used single pieces of fabric.

Johnny: Even I know that a long piece of cotton is

very expensive.

Grandmother: It would have been easier to do each stripe

in one piece, too. But the stripes are so large. It would have been impossible.

Johnny: Look at me! I am as tall as two stripes

put together!

Caroline: And there are 15 stripes!

Grandmother: There must be thousands of stitches here.

Narrator 1: Experts estimate that there are 350,000

hand-sewn stitches in the flag that Mary

made for Fort McHenry.

Grandmother: And see how the same stars are seen from

both sides? You saved fabric and made

the flag lighter!

Mary: I just measured the flag. It's 1,260

square feet!



Caroline: Isn't this going to be too heavy to fly?

Grandmother: Wool is a light fabric. That will help make

the flag light enough to fly in the wind.

Mary: Johnny, will you help me weigh it? Then

I'll send it to the fort.

Johnny: Are you going to get paid a lot of money

for this flag?

Mary: I'm really lucky, Johnny. My mother

taught me an important trade that has

allowed me to support my family.

Caroline: And the storm flag is separate. We'll get

paid for that, too.

Johnny: I've been meaning to ask. Why is the

American flag red, white, and blue?

Grandmother: No one knows for sure. Maybe the red is

for bravery.

Caroline: The white might be for innocence.

Mary: And blue could stand for justice.

Act 5

Narrator 1: In 1812, Francis Scott Key was working as

a lawyer. But he wanted to join the fight

for freedom.

Narrator 2: Key stopped being a lawyer and joined the

war. He helped with cannons and

gathered supplies.

Narrator 1: In September of 1814, British soldiers took

the doctor.

free. But they made the men stay on their ship overnight. The attack on Fort
