Top **10** Things Your First Grader Needs to Know

1.	Read grade-level books with ease and understanding
2.	Read and spell sight words
3.	Write complete sentences with correct capitalization and punctuation
4.	Count , read, and write to 100
5.	Addition and subtraction facts up to 20
6.	Simple two-digit addition and subtraction problems (without regrouping)
7.	Five senses (sight, taste, touch, sound, and smell) to observe and describe things
8.	Living things and their habitats
9.	Rules and responsibilities of being a good citizen
10.	The United States' holidays and symbols



Your first grader has always been a scientist. Curiosity about how things work in the world is natural. During the first grade, your child will be learning about plants, animals, their habitats, the weather, and how to think about investigations and experiments.

These activities will help your child to think scientifically and critically.

Seasonal Talk

When walking to the bus, park, or store, talk about the changing seasons.

Tracking the Weather

Have your child draw a sun, clouds, rain, or snow daily on a calendar to track the weather.

Animal Watching

When outside, take time to notice the animals in your area. Discuss any animals you see and what they are doing.

Sensing Food

Pick a fruit or vegetable and have your child describe it using his or her five senses (sight, touch, taste, sound, smell).
