

blame: the responsibility for doing something wrongcharity: a group that helps people in trouble or in needcommunity: a group of people living in the same placeconsequence: a thing that happens because or as a result of someone's actions

court: a place where a judge and sometimes a jury decide how to punish people who break laws

fine: a sum of a money that a court decides someone must pay as punishment for breaking a law

germs: very, very tiny living things that can spread disease **government:** the group of people who control and make decisions for a country

jail: a place where people are sometimes sent as a punishment when they have broken a law

laws: rules that people in a city, region, or country must follow respect: to care about other people's feelings and opinions
